

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Help the Humane Society Become Debt Free in 2010

Considering the construction, remodeling, and improvements we've completed in the last five years, our Humane Society has done very well, thanks to the generosity of our community. However, we still owe a balance of \$15,000 on our construction loan, and our goal is to eliminate this debt in the coming year.

As part of our capital campaign, we offered naming opportunities for specific rooms in the facility, and for dog runs, puppy pens, cat colonies and cat condominiums. Many permanent plaques are in place for businesses and individuals who made this type of contribution. We would be very close to retiring our debt if we could manage to obtain donations for the following:

Four indoor/outdoor Adoption Dog Runs, at \$2,000 each

One cat colony, at \$2,000

One isolation (pre-adoption) dog kennel, at \$1,000 each

New Animal Rescue Group Formed to Help Nelson County Dogs and Puppies

In June of this year, Bardstown residents, Suzy Bridwell and Chrissy Foreman, began working to reduce the number of adoptable dogs and puppies that are euthanized due to overcrowding at the shelter. Realizing the tremendous need in our county, Suzy and Chrissy decided to form their own rescue group, Barktown Rescue. The animals are housed in foster homes until permanent homes can be found through adoption to individuals or transfer to other rescue organizations.

To date, Barktown has rescued nearly 200 dogs and pups by moving them into breed rescue and other placement organizations, often in northeastern states where shelter dogs are more easily placed. Barktown Rescue also adopts out to individuals whose applications are approved. All animals are spayed and neutered before release to new homes.

Spay and Neuter Programs

Past, Present, and Future

Gratitude for Grants Received

Since 1998, we have assisted over 6,000 pet owners who were unable to afford spay/neuter surgery for their pets without financial help. Initially, we paid for these programs through donations and fundraising, but the demands quickly overwhelmed our budget. We found that the best way to obtain funding was through grants from charitable organizations dedicated to companion animal welfare. At this time, we want to recognize and thank three of these major contributors:

The DJ&T Foundation. Since the end of 2002, we have had yearly grants from the DJ&T Foundation, which was started by Bob Barker who ended every "Price is Right" with, "Remember to spay or neuter your pets." DJ&T has enabled us to help nearly 1,000 pets, primarily dogs, and to buy equipment for our own clinic.

Two Mauds, Inc.. The second organization we'd like to acknowledge is Two Mauds, another non-profit that focuses on helping smaller organizations, like ours, in the Southeast. We've had the maximum number of grants they award, three consecutive years, all designated to subsidize our low-cost Cat Clinic. Two Mauds has enabled us to help over 1,600 cats of low-income owners.

Kentucky Dept. of Agriculture. Our own state government has issued two grants to us, allowing us to help 100 dog owners. This funding is made possible by the sale of spay/neuter license plates now visible on many cars. These plates are available at through the county clerk's office, so please consider buying one next time you renew.

Now for the bad news, grants are not awarded year after year to the same recipients. Many foundations ask on their applications about an organization's plans for future funding and self-sufficiency. It is time for us to find new sources of funding if the spay/neuter assistance program is to continue. We recently received a grant from **Wal-Mart Foundation**, just when we were running out of voucher money, and we would like to express our appreciation at this time. Any individuals, businesses, or community groups wishing to donate to this specific program are urged to do so.

Though we will continue to search for ways to help pet owners, we also want to ask that they do their part, too. If you plan to get a pet, start saving for the spay/neuter surgery right away. Even \$5.00 per week will add up quickly, especially if you start when the dog or cats are very young. Get all family members involved—even kids can help and will learn that veterinary care is part of responsible pet ownership.



Christmas Catnip Clinics



On Saturday Dec. 5 and Tuesday, Dec. 8, we will be holding Christmas Cat Nip Clinics. This is the perfect time of year to get your cats spayed and neutered, **before** next February and March when many cats over 5 months old are already pregnant with their first unwanted litters.

We ask for a \$30 donation on females, and \$20 on males, but no one will be turned away for inability to pay. If you are not financially stressed, we urge you to use a private, full-service veterinary clinic. Cats must be at least 3 months old and 3 pounds in weight. The cost also covers a rabies vaccination, required by state law. Please bring your cats in and help us prevent the birth of unwanted kittens next Spring and Summer. Call 349-2082 to schedule your appointment. Other clinic days are also available.
